On Sunday, September 17, a Mass was held at St. Peters Church at 10:00 am co-celebrated by Bishop Coli. Our State Deputy attended the Mass and assisted in presenting the gifts. Following the

Mass, coffee and cake was served with Council 15995, Fr. Francois Maynard, distributing their funds from the Annual Yard Sale and Bottle Drive.

A second event was held on Sunday, September 17, at St. Andrews Church, Father Baxter Hall, hosted by Council 1130. The State Deputy held a meeting amongst the Knights of District 14 to workout the purpose and structure of the Diocesan Association. After the meeting, the present and past Grand Knights of Council 1130 were presented an award by the State Deputy for recruitment of numerous new members for Leo Council 1130. A social was then held for the rest of the evening.







Nativity Scene Repair

The Nativity Scene erected by Leo Council 1130 each year in Connaught Square had it's beginnings in 1955 when the Council at that time purchased the Statues and Crib for \$1,160.00. 68 years later the tradition is still ongoing.

In 1999, the cement statues which were damaged and over 40 years old, were replaced with hollow plastic statues making it much easier on the backs of our members. The Stable and supporting structure have been updated and repaired over the years as have the statues been touched up with paint. This summer it was decided to do a few

additional repairs. A group of dedicated Knights got together in June of this year and replaced the flooring and support for the floor. Most of the nuts and bolts were also replaced and updated. A template of the statues positioning was drawn on the floor to help in the consistent placing of the statues. Thanks to our Volunteers for their outstanding work and dedication to this project.

The Nativity Scene will again be erected at the beginning of Advent and removed after the Feast of Epiphany.













Pro Life Billboard

As Catholics and Knights of Columbus, we are called to continually promote, develop and defend a Culture of Life that values life from the moment of conception to natural death. In conformity with this conviction, Our Council purchases 'Pro Life' billboards and erects them at Churches within our Council to promote a culture of life.

This year our Council purchased two 'Pro Life' signs. The sign at St. Andrews was vandalized and needed to be replaced. As well, one sign at St. Anthony's was weather beaten, faded, and due for replacement. Our work crew that restored the


Nativity Scene was 'on a roll' and looking for more work to do. They then set their task to attaching the billboard on a sheet of plywood, covering it with a sheet of lexan, and framing the edges. In no time the two billboards were completed.

The billboard at St. Anthony's was installed the same day after removing and disposing of the old sign much to the pleasure of Father Luigi who came out to thank the Knights for their work. The second sign at St. Andrews will be installed as soon as a suitable location is found to place it.











Roses for Life



The Ontario Roses for Life program is an effective way to raise money to support prolife organizations and activities. Two years ago, the Ontario State Council redesigned the Rose Lapel. The new Rose has a red and a white Rose. The red rose signifies our opposition to abortion while the white rose is the symbol opposing euthanasia.

The program is designed to increase awareness of the Culture of Life and pro-life issues such as abortion and euthanasia.

Leo Council will again partake in Rose Sunday during the month of October at Churches within our Council. In past we are able to donate approximately \$1,000.00 to Pro-life Organizations each year through donations received from Rose Sunday.

Our faith tells us that all human life is sacred. We are God's most precious creation. Modern science tells us that this life of ours is an ongoing process of development from conception to natural death. If we are to build a truly just and humane society, we have only one choice to make—to fully embrace this precious gift of life. Pope Benedict XVI makes this clear when he states, "The fundamental human right, the presupposition of every other right, is the right to life itself."

Many do not view all human life as sacred. Actively or passively, they condone abortion, euthanasia, human cloning and the destruction of human embryos for research. Perhaps they do not see the image of God in each person; or know the clear scientific evidence about when life begins; or realize that the United Nations' Universal Declaration of Human Rights states that "everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person."

The Red Rose has long been a symbol of the pro-life movement's respect for the lives of preborn babies and their mothers. The White Rose is an emblem adopted from the Weisse Rose (White Rose) movement that arose in Germany to combat the Nazi regime and its crimes against life. The White Rose is now internationally recognized as the symbol to respect the sanctity of life, thereby saving the lives of the unborn, the sick, and the elderly and reducing the physical and spiritual fallout to those who refuse to respect God's precious

gift of life.



Prayers for the Unborn - St. Andrew's Cemetery



The annual Marian Hour of Prayer for the Unborn was held on Monday, June 12th, 2023, at St. Andrew's Mausoleum with Knights from all city Councils, as well as the Fourth Degree Assembly Knights in regalia participating. Brother Sam Frederico directed the event with Bishop Fred Colli leading the prayer service assisted by Priests and

Deacons. Guest speakers this year were Stewart Rathje of the Right to Life Association of Thunder Bay and Area, Cathy Galle, who helped a young mom through a crisis pregnancy, and Mary Jo McDermott of Rachel's Vineyard which provides healing retreats for those affected by abortion.

Members of Council 1130 volunteered in moving the chairs from the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary Church to Mausoleum and back again. Our volunteers also assisted in seating up the Mausoleum for the prayer service.

















st. andrew's dew drop inn

Beginning in 1990, a team of Knights from Leo Council 1130, offered to assist the St. Andrews Dew Drop Inn. Today, 33 years later, the Members of our Council continue to volunteer their time to serve at the Dew Drop Inn. On the first Sunday of each month, Members of our Council, as well as family members, gather to prepare the meal for the day. Our 'signature' meal is a Turkey Casserole. We have between 6-8 volunteers in the morning working from 9:00 am to noon preparing the meal, desserts, sandwiches, bag lunches, and any other job that needs done. At noon, the morning shift leaves and the afternoon shift arrives to serve the meal. We have 5 volunteers to serve and pack the hot takeout meals, side dishes, deserts and soup, as well as one cleaning tables and the beverage area, plus keeping track of how many meals are eaten inside.

Our Members find the volunteering gratifying and rewarding to be able to give a small amount of their time to help hungry men, women and children by providing a needed meal. This year the Dew Drop Inn is facing challenging times. As of May 2023, the Dew Drop Inn estimates they served 10,000 more meals then the same period in 2022. The daily average number of meals served stands

at 490 with some days reaching as high as 600 meals a day.

Our Council also takes part in the Annual Food Drive for the Dew Drop in which is expanding this year to two Food Drives because of the demand.

As well, our Council contributes annually monetary donations to the Dew Drop Inn and gives \$100 to the DDI in memoriam for each of our members at their death.

We have a great core of volunteer members that come out to help at the Dew Drop Inn each month, but we can always use more. Due to health, travel, and other commitments we find ourselves short staffed on occasions. Family members are always welcome to work and help us out.

2023 DEW DROP INN FOOD DRIVE

The 2023 Knights of Columbus Dew Drop Inn Food Drive took place again on the Mothers Day weekend of May 13 from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm. Council 1130 was again assigned to the Metro Store on River Street. The day was broken up into 4 shifts of 1 1/2 hours each with 6 volunteers on each shift. Volunteers handed out lists of items needed to shoppers entering the store and again collected the items purchased and donated by shoppers. At the end of each shift, a 1/2 ton truck was filled and delivered to the Dew Drop Inn. Overall, all six Councils of the Knights of Columbus in Thunder Bay collected \$5,500.00 in donations and over 5,000 pounds of food items.

"An over flowing basement of food thank you to all of the Councils of the Knights of Columbus and their supporters who once again surpassed all expectations with their annual Mothers Day food drive for the Dew Drop Inn. We knew with the

Knights involved it was going to be great and the support of the community was incredible. We cannot even guesstimate how much food came in to the Dew but we can tell you that \$5,500 in cash and gift cards was collected at the 4 locations in the city. WOW, WOW, WOW! A heartfelt thank you to everyone involved in this wonderful food drive and to the community for your amazing support. So much TLC goes into something like this and with our daily numbers close to 600 some days so the timing is perfect".

Congratulations to all the Knights and their Family members that volunteered. This event would not happen without your dedication and support. Thank You as well to Brother Bill Bragnalo who continues to do an excellent job in coordinating and managing the Food Drive for the Knights and all our Councils. Flowers - St. Andrews Cemetery Priests and Sisters of St. Joseph




In 2003, Leo Council, began planning the Sisters/Priests plots restoration project at St. Andrews Cemetery.

From this project came the annual planting of flowers on all the Priests and Sisters of St. Joseph plots buried in St. Andrews Cemetery. There are 11 Priests buried in the Cemetery and 33 Sisters. With 3 flowers planted on each grave site, that comes to 132 flowers planted per year. Leo Council 1130 as well as Fr. Regis St. James Council 9295 each contribute 50% to the cost of the flowers. In early June of each year a group of volunteer Knights dutifully prepares the grave sites for the flowers by cultivating the soil and removing any weeds. The plants are then devotedly planted on each grave. A weekly watering and maintenance schedule is setup to keep the flowers in fantastic condition until early October when the first frosts arrive. The plants are then removed and we wait until May for the tradition to begin again.

The Sisters of St. Joseph first came to Thunder Bay in 1881 from Toronto and began the teaching ministry at St. Andrew's School. Then in response

to a need, opened St. Joseph's Hospital in 1884 (for three years prior, the convent had been used as a hospital), then in 1885 assumed St. Joseph's Home, the orphanage at the Indian Mission.

In 2021, Sr. Mae Kierans and a group of 19 Sisters of St. Joseph of Sault Ste. Marie came to Thunder Bay and visited the Gravesite of the Sisters in St. Andrew's Cemetery. Sr. Mae wrote our District Deputy the following Thank You note: "I visited the graves of the Sisters in St. Andrews Cemeterv and was deeply touched at how carefully each one was kept with cheerful fresh flowering plants! From the first Sister from Toronto who died, through to the twelve Sisters of St. Joseph of Peterborough and finally my own group of nineteen Sisters of St. Joseph of Sault Ste. Marie. Three of the Sisters died from the typhus epidemic in 1903 - 1904. I want you to know of the loving kindness of the Knights Of Columbus in Thunder Bay who tend these graves so beautifully! Please thank all those involved with remembering the presence of our Sisters in Thunder Bay by faithfully tending their gravesites. We remember you and all our benefactors in our daily prayers."

If it is the 3rd Monday of the month you will find our Council members sponsoring a Bingo at Pioneer Ridge Long Term Care Home on Tungsten Street. The Bingo's are one hour long from 6:15 pm to 7:15 pm.

With 20-30 players per evening, we need from 6-8 Volunteers to help call Bingo, assist in playing, confirm Bingos, and pay the winners. Each winner receives \$2.00 for a Bingo. Our Council allocates approximately \$600 a year to our Bingo Program to assist in the psychosocial wellbeing of Residents in Pioneer Ridge.

Leo Council first began Sponsoring Bingos in 1971 at Dawson Court Home for the Aged. When Dawson Court was closed in 2016, we continued on with Bingos at Pioneer Ridge. During the Covid shutdown our Council was unable to physically hold bingos on site. However, we continued to offer financial support to Pioneer Ridge to purchase prizes for their in-house bingos.

Brother Mark is our long term Coordinator and contact for our Bingo Program and has done an excellent job!

Leo Council 1130 is honoured to be one of 80+ charities in Thunder Bay that is a member of the Superior Shores Gaming Centre. As a member in the Charitable Gaming Centre Association, we are eligible to receive funds that are then used for projects that are consistent with our organization's charitable purposes and provide a direct charitable benefit to the community plus provide donations to other organizations that are eligible to receive lottery proceeds for their own charitable purposes.

Our Council obtained their letter of approval for lottery licensing from the City of Thunder Bay in June of this year and received our permit to participate in OLG charitable games in July.

Thank You to our 10 member Knights who have undergone training and volunteered to help our Council work at Superior Shores Gaming Centre.

Our Council has worked four Bingo's at Superior Shores Gaming Centre up to now and have 6 more scheduled for this year.

Thank You as well to the Superior Shores Gaming Centre that helps Charities and not-for-profits fund raise through charitable gaming so as to provide an important source of funding for services within our City.
